Director's Message

The fall season is an exciting time for bird life in the Bay. Many are using the estuary as a stopover point on their long-distance migrations south, while others prepare to overwinter locally. The fall is also an exciting time at SFBBO. Some of our programs wrap up their field seasons, like our Snowy Plover and Colonial Waterbird Programs. Others, like our Landbird Program at SFBBO's Coyote Creek Field Station and our Waterbird Program, shift into high gear as migrating birds increase the diversity and abundance of birds in the Bay.

Each fall, I particularly enjoy the added excitement that comes with SFBBO's annual California Fall Challenge (CFC). This year, during the CFC—SFBBO's largest fundraising campaign of the year—we hope to raise \$28,000 to support our science and outreach programs in their efforts to conserve birds and their habitats. During the month-long campaign (Sept 13-Oct 12), we'll host more than 20 bird-watching trips and other events designed to show our supporters the incredible diversity of bird life in the Bay Area. In addition to many of the long-standing trips that are so popular each fall, this year we'll also offer the organization's first Kids' Art Contest, hold a new bird banding demonstration event just for families, and lead several birdwalks to view species and places that few people have the chance to experience.

Science Report

Pacific Flyway Shorebird Survey Gains National Recognition

Pacific Flyway Shorebird Survey

Each fall since 2010, SFBBO has worked with over 30 partners to carry out a coordinated program led by Point Blue Conservation Science to monitor wintering shorebirds across 65 sites in Washington, Oregon and California. This effort, called the Pacific Flyway Shorebird Survey (PFSS), is part of the Migratory Shorebird Project, which surveys birds across 10 countries from Canada to Peru, and is the largest coordinated survey of shorebirds in the Americas. The PFSS data is collected by a combination of trained biologists and more than 300 citizen scientists who are experienced birders.

When shorebird data from all 65 sites is evaluated over many years, it helps us better understand how populations are changing over time, which species are at greatest risk, and which habitats are most critical for their long-term survival. For migratory species like many of these shorebirds, we need to understand how populations are changing range-

wide to inform conservation activities.

Wintering Shorebirds in the South Bay

SFBBO's role in this monitoring program is to coordinate surveys of wintering shorebirds in South San Francisco Bay. On November 15, 2013, 19 SFBBO citizen scientists and three staff surveyed nearly 90,000 shorebirds at 40 locations, from Eden Landing and Bair Island down to the San Jose Wastewater Treatment Facility. Highlights included: hotspots in Newark and Eden Landing with 28,000+ and 14,000+ roosting shorebirds, respectively; a Bar-tailed Godwit recorded in an Alviso survey; and an American Avocet banded by USGS 7 or 8 years earlier. Overall, PFSS surveys for the South Bay revealed shorebird abundances that were similar to those observed in 2012.

An Award Winning Effort

On March 12, 2014, Point Blue, SFBBO and the other partner organizations, received a "Wings Across the Americas

In addition, for the third year running, we'll also be conducting a month-long Band-a-Thon to raise funds specifically for our Coyote Creek Field Station. Prizes also include merchandise from vendors like Patagonia, Los Gatos Birdwatcher and REI, and visits to San Francisco's Exploratorium and other exciting destinations.

Prizes will be awarded at our Annual Meeting at Jasper Ridge Biological Preserve in Woodside on Saturday, October 18th. The meeting will also feature bird walks, updates about SFBBO's science and outreach programs, and a silent auction (page 8).

I hope you'll consider participating in our CFC fundraising efforts this year, by joining us for a trip or event, supporting our Band-a-Thon and/or Bird-a-Thon, participating in our fundraising competition, or entering our Click Off photo contest. However you decide to join in, we appreciate your support! Check out the pages that follow, and our website, for more information on how to get involved.
