

RAPTOR BANDING PROGRAM

A group of volunteers and staff from SFBBO participated in the 1984 Raptor Banding Program in the Marin Ilands of the Golden Gate National Recreation Area. We were taught, encouraged and coordinated by Judd Howell, Natural Resources Specialist with the National Park Service. (Judd will be the main speaker at the SFBBO General Membership meeting on May 2.)

Over one hundred people applied for the fifty volunteer positions. Judd, Will Shor, and John Aiken taught five well-organized and informative classes once a week at the offices of the San Francisco Zoological Society. Classes covered raptor identification, use of traps, banding procedures, and program protocol. At the last class there was a twelve page written exam and a quiz with sixteen raptor identification slides, which had to be passed before being qualified to continue with field work.

Field work began on Slacker Hill in Marin just across Golden Gate Bridge in August and extended until the end of 1984. In the first fourteen days of operation 69 individuals of three raptorial species were processed and banded. Each person signed up for one day every two weeks.

banding group met in the morning at East Ft. Baker gather equipment and begin banding at about ten o'clock. Field work consisted of keeping a record of all raptors flying by, controlling one Dho-gaza net and two bow net traps, and then actually banding the birds and

recording standard banding data when the birds were caught.

In the 1985 hawk banding season there will be three working stations in the Headlands from August-December. More volunteers are needed. Introductory meetings were held in March and April of this year. For more information call (415) 556-7733 or (415) 556-9506.

COLONIAL BIRD CENSUS

Spring is here once again (many of us had our doubts. . .) and so is the Colonial Bird Census. Spring is a time of wonder for all of us and helping out on this project is a wonderful way to fully appreciate the splendor of life. Last years Colonial Bird Census was a whopping success due to the many volunteers who spent much time out searching the levee's and marshes for nests, eggs and young birds.

This year the census will be a bit scaled down. The census will focus mainly on colonial nesting birds (Caspian Terns, Forester's Terns, California Gulls and Cliff Swallows) 'and some special attention birds (Northern Harriers, Common Moorhens, Snowy Ployers, Short-eared Owls and Burrowing Owls). We hope you will join us in the census again this year. It's a good way to see yearly changes in populations, changes in locations of colonies and a wonderful way to spend a day. If you have the interest and the time, please give a call and leave your name and phone number and we will get right back to you as soon as the dates and places are set for censusing. 

The 1985 breeding season for the California Gull is underway with two census days already completed in March and April. So now begins the evening census and banding. Approximately every fifth day during May through July, volunteers clad with headlamps and waders meet at dusk for last minute instructions. Work within the colony will take place after dark to prevent predation of chicks and eggs by marauding gulls.

Listed below is a schedule of the days for the census and banding trips to the colony. Many volunteers are needed who can give a few hours of time to help. In this study you are an active participant, not just a spectator. Volunteers are needed to work as a team with the bander doing jobs such as recording, spotting, herding chicks and holding them while being banded. If you are interested in volunteering for this project call the Bird Observatory office.

ECOLOGY SAFARIS FOR NON-SMOKERS

The Cheesemans' Ecology Safaris are offering nature tours for non-smokers to Kenya and Peru plus Australian Wildlife Tours. These trips are for avid birders, naturalista, and wildlife photographers who are in good physical condition, are non-smokers and enjoy being in the field all day.

The Kenya trip, June 15-July 8, costs \$2600 plus airfare and will cover over 1,000 miles. The Peru trip, July 17-August 6, costs \$2300 plus airfare, and includes coastal islands, the Amazon, and the Andes. The Australia and New Guines trip with Doug and Gail Cheeseman is from July 20-August 24. The cost of this trip is \$4275 plus airfare. There are 8 other departure dates scheduled for Australia in 1985. The cost is \$3800 including all flights from San Francisco. SFBBO BIRDING TOURS

From June 21-24 you can tour the Kern River area with Don Starks and Dan Singer. This is a relatively unknown region of California. The South Fork of the Kern River which feeds Lake Isabella about 50 miles east of Bakersfield is one of the few spots in the state where you can expect breeding Yellow-billed Cuckoos along with Indigo Buntings and Summer Tanagers. The area is also very close to Joshua Tree forests and sage brush, so many desert birds are expected such as Cactus Wren, Gray Flycatcher, Black-chinned Sparrows, and Scott's Oriole. When not birding these areas we will be birding the coniferous forests of Seguoia National Forest. This area is beautiful and reminds me of Yosemite without the people. Most of the mountain birds common to the Southern Sierra Nevada are to be expected such as Blue Orouse, Vesper Sparrow, Hermit Warbler. With luck we may get some good owls, too.

The cost of this trip is \$90/person and includes all camp site reservations and fees, museum entrance fees, and the guidance of tour leaders. Not included in the cost are meals, transportation, and sundry items such as beverages, etc. A preliminary meeting with tour participants and leaders is always held approximately two weeks in advance of the tour's starting date in order that car-pooling arrangements can be made as well as handing out bird lists, equipment lists, etc. If you are interested in this trip and would like more information call Don Starks (tour organizer) evenings at (408) 371-9720 or write him at 2076 Foxworthy Ave., San Jose, Ca. 95124.

CCRS FISCAL REPORT

The short and long term survival of the Coyote Creek Riparian Station is dependent upon establishing a firm financial base. We are encouraged by the progress towards our initial goal of \$10,000 for the endowment fund. Interest earned on the endowment fund will be used to pay the monthly expenses of CCRS.

As of April 3, we have raised \$2875 for the endowment fund and another \$1175 for expenses. The cost of registering the trailer, and installing electricity and telephone service came to more than \$1000. We are grateful to three special donors who paid for these necessary one time expenses.


